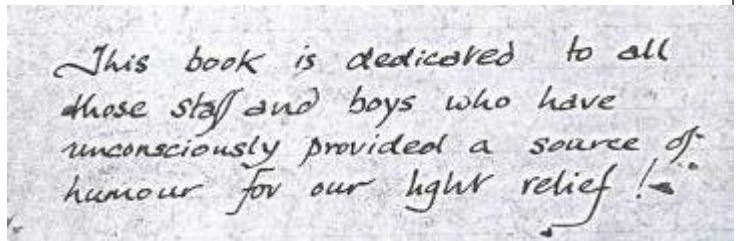
A short time later, the blonde came to the door to collect her money.

Boy after thinking for some minutes " How do you spell 'anywhere' miss"?

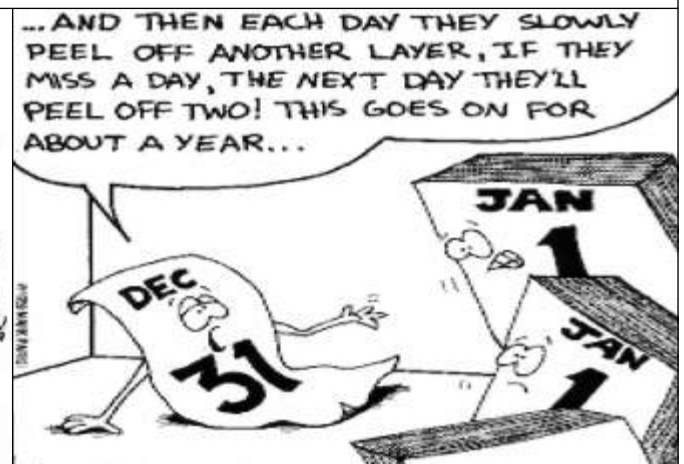

January Parish Council Meeting

The next meeting will be on 10th January at 7pm in the village hall.

Estate Agent Clive Setter from Chew Magna will be visiting to talk about Defibrillators. Clive was instrumental in the design and implementation of the Chew Valley Defibrillator Project so who better to give a demonstration with the demonstrator defibrillator and answer any questions. I know a lot of people are concerned that you have to be highly trained to use them and also how are they maintained and financed? Where would we put them? I do hope as many residents as possible will attend. Who knows how many lives they could save in the future if installed in Kingsdon. I trust our council will give him due time for this as he will be driving down after work and be returning back home to Chew Magna afterwards!

I am told that on the agenda once again will be a discussion on the 'Kingsdon Design Plan'. Having already been approved by the residents of Kingsdon, and voted on at an earlier meeting, I and others believed it had been agreed. Since when, the minutes have had to be re-written to prove us wrong. It would seem that a revised version, unseen by residents, is to be put forward for adoption by the council. I presume this is how some councillors interpret how democracy in action works!!

The author of the original plan, Ben Carlisle, made it perfectly clear that the document, after adoption by the council, could be amended at any time thereafter, so why the procrastination? Those residents interviewed regarding this are somewhat puzzled as to why their views previously expressed are not being acted on by those who are supposed to represent them! Rest assured the Chronicle will fight on behalf of those residents incensed by any proposal to change the original design plan, to one that represents the sole opinion of a couple of councillors. This document is not the property of Kingsdon Parish Council but that of the residents who have, en masse, approved it, and who do not like being treated as mere subordinates.

Somerton Benefice - Clergy Deployment

It is very nearly a year since Revd Jim Hill retired. He is, incidentally, doing well in his new abode near Bath. After prolonged negotiations with the diocesan authorities, it was agreed that his successor should be a "House for Duty Priest" and it was later agreed that the "house" should be the Parsonage in Charlton Adam, where of course Jim and his predecessors had lived. An abortive recruitment exercise was held in the summer. This was repeated in November/December, and finally, to the great relief of Revd Alan Symonds (the Priest in Charge of the Benefice) and many others, resulted in the appointment of Revd Wendy Griffiths, currently working in Wimborne. Wendy is a widow. She is expected to start work amongst us in the Spring.
